



MAIN COMPLEX HALTED!

Announcing "a mistake that has caused more than a little inconvenience," ITF Director Hywel Davies suspended further work on Phase I of the new Main Complex.

Reading a prepared statement, Mr. Davies explained that during an international conference on engineering in Saudi Arabia two years ago, representatives of the Anglo-French Channel Tunnel Project and engineers from the Bank's design firm Kohn, Pedersen & Fox accidentally exchanged blueprints for their respective projects. "The results are very embarrassing." Mr. Davies explained. "Because of this mistake, there is now a 13-story building at the bottom of the English Channel north of Calais, while here in Washington we've dug a tunnel under the Potomac to National Airport."

Speaking with guarantees of anonymity, senior ITF staff pointed out that someone should have noticed something was wrong after three West Virginia landfills were completely filled with earth from the project. "That should have taken 45 years to happen," confided an ITF insider. Other ignored warning signs included extremely poor natural lighting within the structure.

Meanwhile, in Europe, architects and construction workers are toiling frantically to salvage use from the Chunnel Office Building. "It's really hard to keep the kitchen clean with all this silt," said one British designer. "I doubt we'll pass the code inspection."

ITF is considering its options in the wake of the Chunnel debacle, the latest of four major departmental disasters: the inadvertent demolition of the J-building and the Old Executive Office Building in 1990, the accidental detonation of a small thermonuclear device in the H-building in 1987, and the selection of the ITS X-Turbo Personal Computer as the Bank Standard Work Station.

SSASG PAPER TO BE REVIEWED

World Bank Vice President Stephen Eccles, proclaiming that the SSASG Study "ain't over until the fat lady sings," announced the appointment of the Second Support Staff Additional Action Advisory Steering Group (SSSAAASG) to make further recommendations and proposals on support staff issues. THE NEW BANK

Reacting to President George Bush's call for a "new world order," the World Bank today announced new policies governing the type of sanctions that may be imposed upon member states in event of default on obligations secured through the Bank, IFC, or the IMF.

During a press conference in the newly completed World Bank "pit" at the corner of 18th and H Streets NW, World Bank President Barber Conable, described the new measures, including corporal punishment. "Representatives or duly recognized agents of nations that have defaulted on obligations to the Bank or its sister organizations may be spanked, depending, of course, on the severity of the default," Conable explained.

Those include: grounding, suspension of allowance, going to bed without supper, writing MY GOVERNMENT WILL NOT DEFAULT ON LOANS 1,000 times on the blackboard in the World Bank day care center, eating lunch in the J-building cafeteria for six months, or standing on the steps in the E-building lobby and reading the SSASG report aloud.

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= REASSIGNMENT UP, RECRUITMENT DOWN, ADS TO STAY

Internal reassignment rates have doubled and external recruitment has halved due to Personnel's year-old decision to replace its aging Vacancy Information System (VIS) with advertisements in Bank's Wordy, according to a recent \$10.6 million consultant's study. "We are absolutely ecstatic with the response," said Personnel Operations Director Alberto de Capitani, whose department includes both the old VIS function and the Bank's Recruitment Division. "The indicators show success in every part of the Bank."

Mr. de Capitani added that he is currently considering a proposal to replace his entire recruitment team by entering a contractual arrangement with a prestigious London advertising agency.

"We just can't believe how well the ads work," said de Capitani. "They draw an incredible response from Bank staff. In my view, this is only fitting, because Bank's Wordy is without a doubt the most well-written, informative, and useful publication I have ever read, and I mean that sincerely."

TRAVEL NEWS

The American Express Travel Office has announced a low, introductory fare for Time Travel, as long as departures occur within the next 30 days. The special fare is restricted, and includes travel into the future only. Travel into the past will remain at the exorbitant pre-Reorganization rates.

"We highly recommend this to senior managers," said Jacobus Van Den Berg, Chief of the Bank's Travel and Shipping Division. "I just returned from a trip twenty years into the future, and was amazed at how far the Bank has come. For example, dollar budgeting is under active consideration, the SSASG paper will soon be submitted to the AAC, and the petty cash limit is \$50."

PRESTON ANNOUNCES REORGANIZATION

Lewis Preston, slated to become World Bank President after the retirement of Barber Conable on September 1, will completely reorganize the Bank as his top priority.

Preston was purposefully vague as to the specifics of the Reorganization, although some details were made available to the press. Apparently, the Africa and Asia Regions will be split into four regions (Eastern and Southern Africa, West Africa, South Asia, and East Asia). Technical Departments and Country Departments will be scrapped and replaced by "Programs" Departments and "Projects" Departments.

PHOTO BOOK

The Information and Public Affairs Division of the World Bank's External Relations announced today a forthcoming Special Appendix to its January 1991 Special Edition of *The Bank's World*. The Special Appendix will contain names, photographs and titles of "the many staff who wanted to be included in the Special Edition, but didn't make the cut," according to Thierry Sagnier, Editor of *The Bank's World*. Over 600 staff will be listed.

BUDGET STORM

DATELINE: Somewhere in the N-building, April 1, 1991

The 365-day financial battle, code name Budget Storm, continued yesterday with the Bored discussion of the 40-year Frame-Up Paper (FUP). The FUP is the cornerstone of the annual exercises directed by the Polluted Budget Decisions (PBD) department and aims to exhaust the United Complex so they cannot defend themselves against CLawbacks, Undercuts and Deflators (CLUDs).

The cycle begins with Prior Tease, the Bidding Plans, and the B-Pix Reports (previously A-Pix Reports, but they were downgraded), continues with the Middle Age Review and the Budding Proposition, and ends with the Man O' Jeering Contract and the Smart Aleckation. A ceremony for those lost during the cycle is part of the Retrogressive Review. To maintain momentum, all exercises overlap.

The United Complex, commanded by Spendin' Tender Dummkopf, is currently at a standoff with the elite Pecuniary Guard, loyal to S. Picaroon, head of the PBD forces. When unable to negotiate a peace settlement with PBD, the United Complex overcame their own internal strife and joined against Picaroon.

Budget Storm began with an airy attack using outdated Mindlessly Exhausting Missives Often Sent (MEMOS), an ineffective but time-worn strategy. PBD easily countered these attacks with Extremely Moronic statements (EMs). "Our detection system is superior to any attack of MEMOS. We are unaffected by MEMOS. They are strategically totally irrelevant," said a Guard member.

The latest attack aimed at PBD's proposal to increase its own staff yet to disregard the 4,287 tables prepared, revised, and re-revised for the Budding Proposition by all non-PBD units. In a statement read over Radio Free N-building, Picaroon defended his position to journalist Peter R. Not: "An increase of PBD positions implies efficiency, not growth. For each new PBD position, we eliminate 10 staff-years elsewhere. We've tripled our inputs, but we are so efficient, we don't even measure our outputs. We are also reducing costs in other ways, like eliminating budget guideline instructions."

In spite of their purported success, the Pecuniary Guard is apparently experiencing desertion. Rumors abound of a war-torn life in the N-building, with the ever-present threat of Grey Poupon gas. After public criticism of these methods in the Attitude Survey, Picaroon acted quickly to squelch unrest by moving all PBD staff to a 24-hour work day. Each Guard now has three direct managers who provide instructions: it is the staff member's responsibility to figure out who gives the correct guidance.

Picaroon himself is well-known for his ability to absorb MEMOS and EMs at incredible speed. Picaroon never sleeps and often launches his own EMs in the middle of the night. Reportedly, Picaroon himself is PBD's secret weapon: as long as he is in place, the United Complex is unlikely to have its issues heard.

According to Spendin' Tender, only one hope exists for the overthrow of Picaroon and victory over the Mother of all budget cycles. "We look ahead to PMS, the new Preston Missile System. Its characteristics are classified, but suffice it to say that the effect of PMS has been known to topple some women and most men." The world waits.

DEATH ANNOUNCEMENT

On March 31, as the third quarter ended, the BAS was hit by an unidentified flying object and fell dead in its tracks. All efforts to revive it were abandoned following a 5-second attempt by a Bank temporary who didn't know any better. When asked about the demise of the BAS, most people claimed they never really understood the BAS functionality (the specs and manuals were lost) and they expected its death to expedite their work. "In fact," said one budget officer, "we couldn't have planned it any better — and believe me, we tried." No funeral service will be held.
